STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Governing document

The Foundation is controlled by its governing document, a deed of trust, and constitutes a limited company, limited by guarantee, as defined by the Companies Act 2006.

The Frederick Ashton Foundation was incorporated as a private company limited by guarantee at Companies House on 25 May 2011 and registered as a charity by the Charity Commission on 18 August 2011.

Recruitment and appointment of new trustees

The responsibility for the identification and appointment of new trustees lies with the existing trustees.

Induction and training of new trustees

The chairman of the trustees and executive director are responsible for the induction of any new trustee, which involves awareness of a trustee's responsibilities generally, the Foundation's governing documents, and history and philosophical approach of the charity.

Organisational structure

Overall management of the Foundation is vested in a board of trustees who are also the directors of the company. The Foundation employs a part-time executive director. The Foundation's Memorandum and Articles of Association provide no maximum number of directors (trustees).

Risk management

The trustees are responsible for the management of the risks faced by the Foundation. They have reviewed the risks to which the Foundation is exposed and decided actions to be taken to reduce risk. The trustees have agreed to review their Risk Management policy every three years.

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Objectives and aims

The objects of the Foundation are to utilise the legacy of the distinguished English choreographer, the late Sir Frederick Ashton, to advance the education of the public in and the appreciation and performance of the art of ballet and its allied arts in the United Kingdom and throughout the world, and for the public benefit to pursue a broad range of activities and programmes, including ballet reconstructions and revivals, publications, and lectures and videos, and to promote research in all aspects of the subject and to publish the useful results.

Public Benefit

The trustees have noted the principles of Public Benefit, as defined by the Charity Commission, and believe, having regard to the Charity Commission's guidance, that The Frederick Ashton Foundation meets the requirements of Public Benefit.

ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE

Charitable activities

The highlight of this third year of the Frederick Ashton Foundation's existence was undoubtedly the highly-successful Ashton Symposium held at the Royal Ballet School on Sunday 22 September. Entitled *Frederick Ashton: 21st-century choreographer?* and organised by the Foundation to mark the twenty-fifth anniversary of Ashton's death in 1988, the Symposium "celebrated the continuing power and ambition of Ashton's work, focusing on the role of Ashton today and into the future, the preservation of his work, and issues arising from the changing training and perceptions of today's dancers". There was a high attendance, including many students.

The programme included Lesley Collier teaching her *Rhapsody* solo, a *Dream* masterclass given by Sir Anthony Dowell and Dame Antoinette Sibley, and a discussion on the problems and pitfalls of staging Ashton ballets with Desmond Kelly, Margaret Barbieri and Iain Webb, and Wendy Ellis-Somes and Malin Thoors. Other Symposium participants during the day included Richard Alston, Ricardo Cervera, Christopher Cook (who chaired the proceedings), Liz Cunliffe, Francesca Hayward, Stephanie Jordan, Jeanetta Laurence, Alastair Macaulay, Laura Morera, Geraldine Morris, Christopher Nourse, Kevin O'Hare, Jane Pritchard, Anthony Russell-Roberts, Akane Takada and Dawid Trzensimiech.

ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE

Charitable activities

Earlier in the year, the Royal Opera House hosted a Wikipedia editathon, at which the Foundation was represented, when various Ashton entries in Wikipedia were reviewed. As a result, six new articles were created on La Fille mal gardée, Symphonic Variations, Voices of Spring, Rhapsody, Monotones I and II, and The Tales of Beatrix Potter; and entries on Marguerite and Armand, Meditation from Thaïs, A Month in the Country and La Valse were greatly expanded.

In January 2014, the Foundation's website went live (www.frederickashton.org.uk). Funded by Thomas Lynch and designed and built by ex-Sadler's Wells Royal Ballet dancer Oliver Hindle, it aims to complement and point readers towards existing online information about Frederick Ashton. I am most grateful to Oliver Hindle and to co-editors Dr Geraldine Morris and Professor Stephanie Jordan and researcher Tamara Tomic-Vajagic of the University of Roehampton for their assistance.

Looking at other activities, the Foundation is seeking to acquire ownership of various Ashton ballets, implementing a training programme for 'Ashton repetiteurs' and pursuing a programme to film individuals on whom Ashton created work or who worked with Ashton.

The establishment of The Frederick Ashton Foundation in 2011 was made possible by a generous donation from The Tomlinson Family Trust, which also provides annual core funding. Other generous sponsors and supporters since then include Lindsay and Sarah Tomlinson, Thomas Lynch, Christopher Gorman-Evans, Madeleine Plaut, Sir William and Lady Wells, Kristina Rogge, Benjamin Wrey, Michael Foreman and Richard Cooper. On behalf of the Foundation, I thank each and every one of them for their invaluable support.

I would also like to thank my fellow Trustees for their support and our part-time executive director Christopher Nourse for his contribution to the Foundation's affairs. All of us continue to work towards preserving the legacy and work of Frederick Ashton.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

Reserves policy

The Foundation's unrestricted funds at 31 March 2014 are £23,668. Whilst the trustees have established a policy not to build up significant reserves, it is deemed prudent to carry a level of reserve which allows time for future funding to be sought or, if necessary, for the winding up of the Foundation. Accordingly, the trustees have agreed a four year strategy to ensure an appropriate reserve fund of £20,000 is in place by 31 March 2016.

Incoming and Outgoing Resources and Net Movement in Funds

The Statement of Financial Activities for the period ended 31 March 2014 is set out on page 6 of the financial statements.

There was a surplus of funds carried forward for the period of £28,177.

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Accounting convention

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention, the Companies Act 2006 and the requirements of the Statement of Recommended Practice, Accounting and Reporting by Charities.

Financial reporting standard number 1

Exemption has been taken from preparing a cash flow statement on the grounds that the charitable company qualifies as a small charitable company.

Incoming resources

All incoming resources are included on the Statement of Financial Activities when the charity is legally entitled to the income and the amount can be quantified with reasonable accuracy.

Resources expended

Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Charitable activities

This includes all expenditure directly related to the objects of the Foundation.

Governance costs

Governance costs include those incurred in the governance of the Foundation and its assets and are primarily associated with statutory requirements.

Taxation

The charity is exempt from corporation tax on its charitable activities.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements.
